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### GENERAL INFORMATION/ REGULATIONS FOR THE PG DIPLOMA IN GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING (P.G.D.G.C.)

#### A candidate seeking admission to PGDGC Course must satisfy following conditions:

- 1. He/she must be a graduate from any recognized University in Psychology honours or any other discipline with one compulsory paper as Psychology with minimum 45% of marks in the aggregate or equivalent grade or passed some other examination recognized by the Academic Council of this University as equivalent thereof.
- 2. Admission to this course will be purely based on merit. If number of applicants exceeds double of the seats, there will be an Entrance Examination followed by the Department. Reservation of the seats for this course will be as per the admission rules of the University & the reservation policy of the State Government.
- 3. The written entrance examination will be of two hours' duration of 100 marks. The syllabus and pattern of question shall be given in admission test brochure and shall be finalized by a committee of three experts selected by admission committee of the department. The syllabus shall be made up of components taken from degree syllabi.
- 4. Candidates with good interpersonal skills will be preferred.
- 5. Each paper in the curriculum (Theory/Practical/Project/Field work) shall be an independent entity and shall be evaluated separately. The attendance and marks obtained in each entity should be above a minimum required level.
- 6. The title of papers and the content therein shall be subject to revision from time to time by the Board of courses of Study and the Academic Council of the University within the curriculum structure stated herein.
- 7. That all candidates shall be required to take up Project/Dissertation/Field work of approximately onemonth duration under the supervision of a University teacher.

#### Duration

- 8. The session shall commence from 1st of July.
- 9. The candidate admitted to the PGDGC shall undergo the prescribed course of study for one academic session, comprised of two semesters.
- 10. PG Diploma (Guidance and Counselling) programme shall follow the Semester pattern of instructions and examination.
- 11. PGDGC course leading to PG Diploma in Guidance and Counselling in the Faculty of Social Sciences shall be of one-year duration and shall run on full-time regular basis under self-financing scheme. At the end of semester, there shall be a University Evaluation of 100 marks each.
- 12. Academic Year: Two consecutive (one odd + one even) semesters constitute one academic year.
- 13. Semester: The <u>Odd Semester</u> is scheduled from July to December and the <u>Even Semester</u> is from January to June. Each week has a minimum of 40 working hours spread over 6 days.
- 14. Each semester will include Admission, course work, conduct of examination and declaration of results including semester break.
- 15. An academic year comprising 180 working days in the least is divided into two semesters, each semester having at least 90 working days. With six working days in a week, this would mean that each

semester will have 90/6 = 15 teaching/ working weeks. Each working week will have 40 hours of instructional time.

- 16. Each year the University shall draw out a calendar of academic and associated activities, which shall be strictly adhered to. The same is non-negotiable. Further, the Department will make all reasonable endeavors to deliver the programmes of study and other educational services as mentioned in its Information Brochure and website. However, circumstances may change prompting the Department to reserve the right to change the content and delivery of courses, discontinue or combine courses and introduce or withdraw areas of specialization.
- 17. Each paper shall cover courses for theoretical or practical examination as laid down by the Board of Courses of Study in the subject and approved by the Academic Council.
- 18. A candidate shall be required to clear all the papers within TWO academic years from the date of entry in the PG Diploma programme to be eligible for the award of the PG Diploma in Guidance and Counselling. Thereafter the registration will stand automatically cancelled.
- 19. A department may, at its discretion, grant an interruption of a programme of study to a candidate on grounds of illness or other adequate cause for a maximum period of one year in total. Interruptions in excess of one year shall only be permitted with the approval of the Academic Council.

### **Intake Capacity**

20. The maximum number of the candidates should be hundred (100) only.

### **Medium of Instructions**

21. The medium of instructions will be in Hindi and English

### **Credit of Courses**

- 22. The term 'credit' refers to the weightage given to a course, usually in terms of the number of instructional hours per week assigned to it. The workload relating to a course is measured in terms of credit hours. It determines the number of hours of instruction required per week over the duration of a semester (minimum 15 weeks).
  - a) One hour of teaching/ lecture or two hours of laboratory /practical work will be assigned per class/interaction.

One credit for Theory	= <u>15 Hours of Teaching</u> i.e., 15 Credit Hours
<b>One credit for Practicum</b>	= <u>30 Hours of Practical work</u> i.e., 30 Credit Hours

 b) For credit determination, instruction is divided into three major components: Hours (L) – Classroom Hours of one-hour duration. Tutorials (T) – Special, elaborate instructions on specific topics of one-hour duration Practical (P) – Laboratory or field exercises in which the student has to do experiments or other practical work of two-hour duration.

### **Examination Regulations**

The eligibility for appearing in Examinations and promotion criteria and validity for registration shall be governed by the Examinations Rule of the Ranchi University. For detail see 'Regulation of PG CBCS' available at RU website. However, some of the important rules are undermentioned:

- 23. Examination Regulation for PG Programme of 40 Credits & for other PG Courses
  - a) Mid Semester Theory Examination/ Sessional Internal Assessment (SIA) in all Courses will be organized at Department/ College/ Institution level.
  - b) End Semester University Theory/ Practical Examination (ESUE) in all Courses will be organized at University level.
  - c) Practical Examinations will be conducted by One External & One Internal Examiners to be appointed by the Controller of Examinations/Competent Authorities.

#### 24. Marks Weightage and Scheme of Examination

- a) Each non-practical/non-project course (FC/CC/EC) shall be of 100 marks having two components:
   70 marks shall be assigned to the End Semester University Examination (ESUE), conducted by the University, and, 30 marks for Sessional Internal Assessment (SIA), conducted by the Department/College.
- b) The marks of SIA shall further break into, 20 for Internal Written Examinations, 05 for Written Assignment/ Seminar presentation and 05 for overall performance of a student including regularity in the class room lectures and other activities of the Department/College.
- c) There shall be two written internal examinations, each of 1-hour duration and each of 20 marks, in a semester out of which the 'Best One out of Two' shall be taken for computation of marks under SIA.

### 25. Guidelines for Question Setter:

- a) SIA: There will be a uniform pattern of questions for mid semester examinations in all the courses and of all the programmes. There will be two groups of questions in 20 marks written examinations of one hour duration. Group A is compulsory and will contain five questions of very short answer type consisting of 1 mark each. Group B will contain descriptive type five questions of five marks each, out of which any three are to be answered. Department may conduct Sessional Internal Examinations in other format as per need of the course.
- b) **ESUE**: End semester University examinations of **three hours' duration** for Odd semester (1st semester) will normally be held in the month of December every current academic. Similarly, the end semester University examinations for Even semesters (2nd semester) will normally be conducted in the month of June every current academic year.

There will be a uniform pattern of questions for all the courses and of all the programmes. There will be **two** groups of questions. **Group A is compulsory** and will contain two questions. **Question No.1 will be very short answer type** consisting of five questions of 1 mark each. **Question No.2** will be short answer type of 5 marks.

**Group B will contain descriptive type six** questions of fifteen marks each, out of which any four are to be answered. The questions will be so framed that examinee could answer them within the stipulated time.

[Note: There may be subdivisions in each question asked in Theory Examinations. Attendance weightage: Upto 45%, 1mark; 45%<Attd.<55%, 2 marks; 55%<Attd.<65%, 3 marks; 65%<Attd.<75%, 4 marks; 75% < Attd, 5 marks )]

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c) Practical/ Project courses would also be of 100 marks but there **shall be no internal written examinations** of the type specified above. The total 100 marks will have three components: 70 marks for the practical ESUE and 20 marks for the Viva-voce examination conducted during the ESUE to assess the applied and practical understanding of the student. There shall be a University Examination for 100 marks of 3 hours' duration and 1 hour may be added for the formalities like Record keeping and Viva-voce.

The written component of the project (**Project Report**) shall be of 70 marks and 20 marks will be for the Viva-voce examination jointly conducted by an external examiner, appointed by the University, and the internal supervisor/guide.

10 marks in both cases mentioned above will be assigned on cumulative assessment of examinee during the semester and will be awarded by the department/faculty concerned.

- 26. There shall be no Supplementary or Re-examination for any subject. Students who have failed in any subject in an even semester may appear in the subsequent even semester examination for clearing the backlog. Similarly, the students who have failed in any subject in an odd semester may appear in the subsequent odd semester examination for clearing the backlog.
- 27. That the result of examination shall be notified by the Controller of Examinations of Ranchi University in different newspapers and shall also be placed in Departmental notice board.
- 28. That each successful candidate shall receive his/her mark sheet and certificate in the prescribed form specifying the subject in which he/she was examined and the class in which he/she was placed.
- 29. That if a student is found to have indulged in any kind of malpractice or caught indulging in any malpractice, as per the regulations under 'Examinations' Chapter-III of Ranchi University Code, Part-IV the examination given by the student will be cancelled and the candidate will be awarded 'ZERO' marks and declared as "FAIL" The candidate has to reappear for the subject (paper) in the subsequent examination as a non-collegiate candidate.

### Minimum Passing Marks in a Course:

- 30. To earn academic credits requisite for a non-practical / non-project course, a student would have to secure a minimum of 28 marks in the ESUE and a minimum of 17 marks in the SIA to clear the course. In other words, a student shall have to pass separately in the ESUE and in the SIA by securing the minimum marks prescribed here:
  - a) If a student failed to secure pass marks in Mid Semester, he/she has to reappear in Mid & End Semester Examinations.
  - b) In case a student is fail to secure pass marks in End Semester Examination, then he/she has to appear only in End Semester Examination of following Sessions within period of Upper Limit of Two Years. Marks of Mid Semester will be carried for the preparation of result.

### Course fee

- 31. To be admitted to PG Diploma in Guidance and Counselling course, a candidate must pay tuition fee, development fee, course fee, examination fee, library fee, laboratory fee etc. quantum of which shall be decided by the syndicate from time to time.
- 32. That the result of examination shall be notified by the Controller of Examinations of Ranchi University in different newspapers and shall also be placed in Departmental notice board.

33. That to be admitted to Post Graduate Diploma in Guidance and Counselling (PGDGC) a candidate should pay Tuition fee, Developmental fee, Course fee, Laboratory fee, Library fee etc. This includes Rs. 12,500.00 (Rupees Twelve Thousand Five Hundred Only) per Semester, total Rs. 25000/- (Rupees Twenty-Five Thousand Only), For ST/SC Rs. 10,500/- (Rupees Ten Thousand Five Hundred Only) per Semester, total Rs. 21,000.00 (Rupees Twenty-One Thousand Only).

34. Admission Form and Examinations fee will be collected as per Ranchi University norms.

### **Offering PGDGC Course**

- 35. This PG Diploma Course should be introduced either in PG. Department of the concerned University or in such colleges where other PG Courses are being run by the University and adequate infrastructural facilities are available to run that particular course. For starting these courses in colleges there must be a precondition of running the concerned course in the college concerned at undergraduate level for at least five years.
- 36. The University will ensure that the curriculum including practical session and infrastructure facilities should be as per UGC norms and standard and the regulations should be conformity with the provisions of UGC-Regulation regarding specifications of degree. The University will seek mandatory permission/Approval of UGC-/Regulation bodies where ever required before starting the proposed courses. This will apply in case of running courses also.
- 37. There will be specific provision to provide teaching facilities to run the courses. The qualification and number of teachers for each course will be as provisions laid down by the UGC. The teachers will be engaged on full time contractual basis as per norms and standards prescribed by UGC.
- 38. Important and necessary documents of PG Diploma in Guidance and Counselling shall be kept as per the guidelines of the University.
